Ingathering- Mingling the Waters

Sunday, September 11th—Mingling the Waters

Even though we gather for services every Sunday during the summer, we often find that we don't see each other as often as vacations and family call us elsewhere. As with many faith traditions, Unitarian Universalists often designate an early September Sunday as Ingathering: a recognition that the community is coming together again and reconnecting. It's a long-standing Unitarian Universalist tradition on our Ingathering Sundays to bring water representing a meaningful moment in our recent lives: perhaps a heartfelt conversation, a gorgeous sunset, a special time with family or friends.

We invite you all to bring a tiny amount of water from a place or event that mattered to you over the summer. During our worship this Sunday, we will pour our water into a common container, to represent the ways in which our lives are coming together again. It's a joyful moment: we hope you will attend and join in!

September: Invitation

Our Theme for September is Invitation

September is a time for turning: turning toward fall, turning back to what we think of as our 'regular' lives. It's a time for new beginnings: a new school year, perhaps a new house or apartment, and a time for re-engaging with activities that we perhaps put down for a few months.

Life is just not business as usual in September! And with so many adjustments it's a time when we can be more open to new things, to look carefully at our lives and see what's important, to listen for where we are being called.

Our theme for September, with all its new possibilities, is Invitation. What calls to your heart now? Are you making space to listen and think about what you might be hearing? What might it mean for you to accept an invitation? We will be exploring questions such as this throughout the month, both in worship and at our monthly group conversation. Typically we meet after coffee hour on the first Sunday of the month. This month we will gather on September 18. Mark your calendar for a heartfelt conversation about Invitation!

The free concert series presented by the Gloucester Meetinghouse Foundation, *Music on Meetinghouse Green*, has been a great success in its first season and plans are already afoot for next year. Each Friday evening since July 8th has featured a different musical offering, using the Meetinghouse entrance platform as a stage and the green as an outdoor concert hall.

Many patrons enjoyed picnicking under the shade trees as they enjoyed the concerts. Via free-will offerings, raffles and membership opportunities, each event has been a benefit for a different partner non-profit.

The first event was raised \$1,200 to benefit Pathways for Children with music by John Baboian's Berklee Jazz Quintet.

In the weeks that followed music included many Gloucester Unitarian Universalist Church members such as Ken Steiner's Ensemble with music of New Orleans, Willie Alexander with the Raztones, and Deb Hardy with Alternate Roots Band plus many others such as the Northshoremen Barbershop Chorus and Peter Souza with 3 Sheets to the Wind. Non-profit partners many others who do great work in our community such as as the the Writers Center, Kestrel Educational Adventures, Art Haven, the Angel Opioid Program and the Schooner Adventure. The August 26th event beat all the others in the amount donated, raising \$1,700 for the Grace Center.

Staff who handled the logistics and publicity for the series included Church members Jeremy Melvin on lighting, Newt Fink and Marylou Bassani on setup and takedown, plus Rose Sheehan as event coordinator. The 3-part movable stage was built by Jim Clarizia of Lighthouse Construction and his crew who are slated to do the upcoming Church kitchen renovation. We are grateful to everyone who lent a helpful hand or advice.

The final concert will be performed by the Cape Ann Big Band on Friday, September 9th, to benefit the upcoming Fire-Sprinkler and Deterrence Project. The is the top priority of the Gloucester Meetinghouse Foundation to protect the grand 1806 church building from loss by fire. The overall mission of the GMF is to preserve our historic building as a civic hub, cultural venue and community center for the good of all. 
